Sicily, "The key to Everything"

an online lecture by Dr. Douglas Kenning

Let us rediscover the Sicily once known to every schoolchild, the Sicily that gloried in two golden ages, when twice she was a turning point of Western Civilization. We begin with mythic Sicily—Demeter and Persephone, Skylla and Charybdis, Homer's *Odyssey*, Virgil's *Aeneid*. This leads us to the Sicily that became the wealthiest part of the ancient Greek world, that defeated Athens, that taught civilization to the Romans and through them to us. Then, under Arab and Norman rule, she helped ignite the Renaissance. Hers is a history repeatedly magnificent, mythic, monsterplagued, and mistreated, alternatively glorious and tragic, a story we shall explore through hundreds of beautiful images.

Douglas Kenning, Ph.D., is a professor of history and literature, with a doctorate from the University of Edinburgh, in Scotland. He has taught at universities in Europe, Asia, and the U.S., and has written books, articles and stage plays. He lives half the year in Petaluma, and the other half of the year in Sicily.

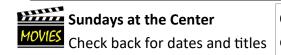
POPULAR ITALIAN SURNAMES - Is Your Name Listed?

- 1. This surname comes from the word 'bianco,' meaning 'white' and was often given to a person who had white hair or a very light complexion.
- 2. The surname was derived from the Latin word, 'marinus,' meaning 'of the sea'.
- 3. Deriving from the Old French word, 'conte' meaning count, it denoted someone who worked for a count (noble) or was possibly himself a count.
- 4. This popular surname means 'boy' or 'a young apprentice' in Italian.
- 5. Is said to be the most common surname in all of Italy and very common in other countries due to the Italian diasporas during the 19th and 20th centuries.
- 6. If you love trying different hats, you could try this popular surname as a nickname, which means 'a little round hat'.
- 7. Originally deriving from Martinus, or commonly known as Mars, the Roman god of war and fertility, the name has become famously linked to a drink.
- 8. A patronymic (a name that derived from the name of the father) surname meaning 'son of Luca.' The given name was the Italian translation of Luke, from the Greek name Loukas meaning from Lucania, a region found in Italy.
- 9. This is a geographical surname for someone who came from Lombardy, a specific region in Italy which received its name from the Lombards, a Germanic tribe who invaded the region in the 6th century.
- 10. From the Italian word for brown. It was a nickname for a person with brown clothing, hair, or skin. It comes from the German word, 'brun,' meaning dark brown.
- 11. The Roman word Valens is the root word for this surname, which means 'healthy and vigorous'.
- 12. This surname is from the Italian word for dove and was a last named often given to dove keepers. This name also increased in popularity during the middle ages due to the fact that the dove is a symbol of the Holy Spirit in Catholicism.
- 13. This last name is an occupational surname from the Italian word 'ferraro', which means blacksmith.
- 14. This was a nickname for a proud person or one with a vain or cocky attitude. It comes from the Latin 'gallus,' which means cock or rooster.
- 15. The Italian word for 'Romanus' and the Latin word for Rome. This popular Italian surname was often used to denote an individual from Rome, Italy.
